SEPTEMBER

- Tune in to the Senior College Info Night (virtually) on Sept. 17th at 6 pm to get some important information regarding postgrad/college planning
- . Complete your Senior credit check with your counselor
- Begin using <u>Naviance</u> to sign up to attend virtual college rep visits to hear detailed information about schools you're interested in
- Attend college fairs (virtually)
 - o Christian College Fair of Colorado from Sept. 21-24
 - o College Fairs of Denver from Sept. 28-29
 - o NACAC National College Fair on Sept. 30

<u>OCTOBER</u>

- Know your college admissions requirements and application deadlines
- · Begin the application process
 - o Use the 'Basic Application Steps' sheet in this packet
 - o Ask your counselor or post-grad if you need help
 - Create an email account to use for applications and make sure it's appropriate!
 - If you use the common app, check to see whether each separate school has extra supporting documents you need to submit
- Continue working on your college essay and keep your resume updated
- Take the SAT on Oct. 27th at OHS
- Check the Naviance scholarship list every week and apply to the ones you qualify for
- Prepare to apply for FAFSA (opens Oct. 1st)
 - Get your FSA ID on the FAFSA website-you will need it to apply starting Oct. 1st
 - Complete the FAFSA forecaster to find out what your EFC (estimated family contribution) may be for college
 - o This is based off of your parents' previous tax information from last year
 - o Please visit www.fafsa.ed.gov

- What happens if I need tutoring services?




Admissions Requirements

- GPA
- Test Scores (Many are Test-Optional)
- "ACE"ing High School
 - Academics Performance and rigor of courses completed
 - Community Service
 - Extracurricular Activities/Leadership Contributions
- College (Admissions) Essay
- Letters of Recommendation if needed



The Application Process

- Transcripts
- Additional Application Parts

Apply Online

- Once you have researched colleges, you will apply to those institutions online by either:
 - Submitting an application through the college website
 - Using <u>The Common Application</u> (if used by that college)
 - Using <u>The Coalition for College</u> (if used by that college)
- Make sure to read all directions carefully on every application
- Apply as a "Freshman", "Undergraduate", "New Student", or "Prospective Student"
- Double check to see if there are any portions of the application that must be completed by a teacher or counselor (for example, if you need a letter of recommendation).



Transcripts

- Every time you apply to a College/University you must fill out a BLUE transcript request form.
 These are located in the Post Grad office located in the IST on the 2nd floor, across from Mr. Sewell's desk.
- The first two transcripts are free! After that, students are charged \$5 per transcript!
- Transcripts are sent to the colleges you are applying to and will include your:
 - Grades (starting with 9th grade)
 - Class Rank
 - GPA
- Transcripts will *not* include test scores- you must send these on your own by logging into your <u>ACT</u> and/or <u>College Board</u> account.
- Know your deadlines! You must allow TWO weeks for processing.



Additional Application Parts

Letters of Recommendation

- o Some colleges require students provide 1 or 2 letters of recommendations, usually from teachers
- Make sure you ask a teacher from at least 11th grade who knows you well
- o Providing the teacher a <u>resume</u> or <u>brag sheet</u> is helpful
- Ask for a letter no less than 2 weeks from the deadline- more if possible!
- Say thank you to the teacher/recommender verbally and written

College Essay/Personal Statement

- Follow instructions carefully
- Double check your spelling/grammar
- Ask an adult to look over it before submitting



Know Your Application Deadlines

Early Action (EA) An option to submit your applications before the regular deadlines.

When you apply early action, you get admission decisions from colleges earlier than usual. Early action plans are not binding, which means that you do not have to enroll in a college if you are accepted early action.

Early Decision (ED) An option to submit an application to your first-choice college before the regular deadline.

When you apply early decision, you get an admission decision earlier than usual. Early decision plans are **BINDING**. You agree to enroll in the college immediately if admitted and offered a financial aid package that meets your needs. Some colleges have an early decision option called ED II, which has a later application deadline than their regular ED plan.

Priority Date or Deadline

The date by which your application — whether it's for college admission, student housing or financial aid — must be received to be given the strongest consideration.

Rolling Admission*

An admission policy of considering each application as soon as all required information (such as high school records and test scores) has been received, rather than setting an application deadline and reviewing applications in a batch. Colleges that use a rolling admission policy usually notify applicants of admission decisions quickly.
